

Member-at-Large Nominee: **Brian Chartier, Ph.D., R.D. Psych.**

Brian earned his doctorate in clinical psychology in 1985 from the University of Saskatchewan. From 1982 to 2018 he was an associate professor of psychology at St. Thomas More College. He has published articles in *International Journal of Indigenous Health*, *Omega: Journal of Death and Dying*, *Illness, Crisis and Loss*, *Canada's Mental Health*, and the *Saskatchewan Medical Journal*. Along with co-authors, he has recently published a chapter entitled Intrusions: Third-Party Requests for Psychotherapy Information in *Ethics in Action: Personal Reflections of Canadian Psychologists* (2024). He has taught a variety of undergraduate courses, as well as graduate courses in psychological assessment and professional ethics. He retired from the university in 2018 and is a professor emeritus of psychology at St. Thomas More College. In addition to his academic career, Brian is the founder of CASA Psychological Services, which he established as a part-time solo practice in 1989. He continues to work in private practice, providing therapy to couples and adults, with extensive experience in the areas of grief and bereavement. He has conducted a wide variety of psychological assessments, including psychological assessments of claimants subjected to abuse at Indian residential schools. He has also facilitated numerous Grief Ministry Workshops. Beyond clinical work, Brian is dedicated to mentoring and training the next generation of psychologists. He supervises provisional psychologists, residents, and practicum students. He has contributed to the community and the profession through his service on the Board for Saskatoon's Friendship Inn, Board of Family Service Saskatoon, the Board of Association for Death Education and Counseling, as well as the Board of the Saskatoon Community Village. Passionate about the ever-evolving profession of psychology, Brian hopes to have the opportunity to bring his 40 years of experience in postsecondary education, private practice, and community engagement to the profession in the role of Member at Large with the Saskatchewan College of Psychologists.
